

TEACHER-REGISTERED APPRENTICE PROGRAM
T-RAP

An individual officially enrolled in a Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP), receiving paid on-the-job training and related instruction.

The essential skills and knowledge that apprentices must demonstrate to progress in the program.

The business or organization providing apprentices with workplace experience and skill development.

An experienced educator who provides guidance, support, and evaluates apprentices on their competencies.

Hands-on classroom experience where apprentices develop practical teaching skills under the guidance of a mentor teacher.

The educational component of an apprenticeship, provided by institutions like colleges, trade schools, or online programs.

An organization that has administrative oversight and responsibility for an apprenticeship program.

Registered Apprenticeship is an industry-driven, high-quality career pathway where employers can develop and prepare their future workforce. Individuals can obtain paid work experience, receive progressive wage increases, complete classroom instruction, and earn a portable, nationally-recognized credential.

UAA's Bachelor of Arts, Early Childood Education Licensure Track includes required courses for DEED licensure (Alaska Studies & Multicultural) **Active UAA Apprentices**

Since its launch, UAA's apprenticeship program has supported 48 active apprentices, with steady growth despite 8 withdrawals and 6 unenrolled participants.



Completion Rate

68% of apprentices successfully completed all their enrolled courses in Fall 2024, demonstrating the program's overall effectiveness in supporting student success.

Registered Sponsors

Six sponsors, including DEED, ASCF, and SHI, fuel the program's success, with ASD soon joining the ranks.

Apprentices collectively attempted 96 courses during Fall 2024, with 69 successfully passed, resulting in an overall pass rate of 72%.

Each apprentice enrolled in an average of 2 to 3 classes during Fall 2024, reflecting the balance between coursework and on-the-job training.

Alaska Native Pass Rate

Alaska Native apprentices attempted 68 courses and passed 47, achieving a 69% pass rate and contributing significantly to the program's overall success.

Male Apprentices

Four (9%) male apprentices are part of the program, reflecting the continued need to increase male participation in education fields.

Male apprentices attempted 16 courses during Fall 2024, with 8 successfully passed, highlighting both progress and opportunities for additional support.



ENTRY LEVEL PATHWAYS

UAA's flexible Pathways 1, 2, and 3 meet students at various academic stages. Whether starting with prior college credits or beginning fresh, students can join at multiple entry points. The journey is fully remote and customizable - students can celebrate success at key milestones by earning an OEC, advancing to an AAS degree, or continuing through to a bachelor's degree. The choice belongs to each individual.

SUNRAE

Occupational Endorsement Certificate (OEC) in Infant & Toddler Development

18 credits. Prepares students to work with infants and toddlers in a variety of settings, including childcare, family care settings, and Early Head Start programs. Requires 18 credit hours and can be completed in one school year.

SUNRAE

Associate of Applied Science (AAS) in Early Childhood Development

42-45 credits. Requires the OEC. Prepares teaching assistants, Head Start teachers, preschool teachers, and other learning professionals to work in early care and education settings, including the public school system. Pepares candidates to work with young children from birth to eight years. Engages candidates in course-based field experiences to apply teaching and learning principles directly.



KODIAK COLLEGE PATHWAYS




The Kodiak College/UAA Associate of Arts degree in general studies provides students with a versatile foundation applicable for transfer to numerous institutions. While broadly applicable, this program was specifically designed to align with the University of Alaska Southeast's bachelor's degree programs in Special Education (Grades K-12) and Elementary Education (Grades K-8) with teacher licensure. This intentional alignment allows graduates to

transition seamlessly into these UAS programs without loss of credits or academic momentum.

The Kodiak College AA program features fully remote classes and 8-week accelerated courses to enhance student success. Learn more about Kodiak College's Compass Career Pathways Program.

62 credits. Provides an academic foundation for success in multiple pathways, including life, career preparation, continued study, and engaged citizenship for Alaska's diverse peoples.

Bachelor of Arts in Elementary Education or Special Education

60-62 credits. Requires the AA. UAS offers BAs in Elementary Education and Special Education. SUNRAE 4 prepares candidates to transfer into those programs easily, having completed 62 of the required 120 credits.

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POST BACCALAUREATE CERTIFICATE

The Post-Baccalaureate Certificate in Early Childhood Education provides a pathway for bachelor's degree holders to obtain PreK-3 teacher licensure. This specialized credential program is structured for professionals in the education sector, offering comprehensive preparation for instructing children from birth through age eight within public education systems. The curriculum transforms existing academic credentials into professional qualifications, facilitating entry into classroom instruction roles.



SUNRAE

Post-Baccalaureate Certificate in Early Childhood Education Pre-K - Third Grade

42 credits. Requires a Bachelor's Degree (in any subject). The Post-baccalaureate (PBCT) in Early Childhood Education prepares PK-3 licensed teachers and other learning professionals to work in the public school system. The program prepares candidates with an existing baccalaureate degree to work with young children from birth to eight years. Approved for Type A Licensure through DEED.

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





Homegrown teachers have larger contributions to student achievement and higher retention rates than other novice teachers.

Teachers who complete a high quality preparation program <u>prior</u> to being hired as a teacher of record are 3x more likely to remain in the profession.




