Through our registered apprenticeship model and partnerships with Head Start, school districts, and childcare facilities, students can earn while they learn and seamlessly progress from certificate to Bachelor's degree, with flexible pathways accommodating both new students and working professionals.

ANTICIPATED TIME TO COMPLETION

The time to complete the program varies based on full-time or part-time status. We create personalized plans that account for transfer credits and recognize industry-specific certificates, ensuring every student can advance in a way that aligns with their goals and commitments.

Full-time Students

With no prior college credits or industry certificates can complete the bachelor's degree in four years by taking 15–18 credits/semester

Additionally, our Learning Commons offers academic tutoring and coaching, helping students thrive academically. With these comprehensive resources in place, our program is designed to set you up for success every step of the way.

SUPPORTS FOR MENTORS

The SUNRAE program is dedicated to supporting our partner districts and tribal organizations in delivering high-quality, culturally responsive mentorship and assessment programs. Our approach honors the vital relationship between mentor teachers and preservice teachers, a practice seamlessly extended to our apprenticeship program. Handouts are available to help mentors understand the expectations of apprentices, including courses with field experiences, observation forms and surveys, and the teaching portfolio. When an apprentice engages in a practicum or internship field experience, UAA hires the mentor as an adjunct faculty member, providing adjunct pay, longevity benefits, and valuable experience to enhance their resume. We also maintain regular communication with mentors, offering support and holding meetings as needed to ensure their success. By partnering with UAA, mentors not only shape the future of education but also gain professional growth and recognition.
