

The Alaska Reads Act



District-Wide Early Education Program ADM Approval Requirements

The Alaska Reads Act (House Bill 114, Chapter 40, SLA 2022) provides school districts with the opportunity to build and grow their early education programs for 4- and 5-year-old students by providing Foundation Formula funding to approved district-wide early education programs.

In order for school districts to count early education children as one-half (0.5) of a full-time equivalent student, the district-wide early education programs must:

- Apply for approval- Form #05-23-053 *District Wide Early Education Program Approval* form by August 1 in 2023 and May 15 for all years after that;
- Consult with local high-quality early education programs- Form #05-23-050 *District-Wide Early Education Consultation* form;
- Provide evidence that all Early Education Program Standards are currently being met district-wide- Form #05-23-056 Early Education Program Standards Evidence form; and,
- Receive approval from the Department of Education and Early Development by September 1.

Eligible students for Foundation Formula funding must be enrolled in a state approved district-wide early education program.

There are instances when 4- and 5-year-old students cannot be counted in a district's average daily membership (ADM) that determines Foundation Formula funding. Students that are enrolled in pre-elementary programs that receive state and/or federal funding specifically for pre-kindergarten programs are not eligible to be counted in a district's ADM. See the table below. For example, the District-Wide Early Education Grant and the State Pre-Elementary Grant have one purpose, to improve early education in the state, thus students attending these programs **cannot** be counted in a district's ADM.

On the other hand, funding sources that have multiple purposes, not solely for pre-kindergarten programs, can supplement Foundation Formula funding. For example, Title I, Part A funds can be used for a variety of purposes. These funds are provided to districts with high numbers or percentages of children from low-income families to help ensure that all children meet challenging academic standards. Since these funds can be used for K-12 education, they are not provided specifically for early education programs. Students who are 4- and 5-years old attending these programs **can** be counted in a district's ADM.
