
Mission, Vision, and Purpose



House Bill 114

Early education standards:

AS 14.07.165(a)(5)(A)

The board shall adopt standards for a locally designed, evidenced-based program that meets Head Start Program Performance Standards and other federal standards for early education programs to receive federal funding.

- Requirements for a teacher in charge of the program
- Developmentally appropriate objectives for children four and five years old

Early Education Advisory Committee (EEAC)

The EEAC is an advisory committee of 10 early childhood practitioners and 5 State of Alaska staff

Purpose

Provide feedback to the DEED Early Learning Team in order to provide different perspectives as the team creates implementation strategies and regulations related to DEED Early Childhood Programs.

Early Education Program Standards Purpose

Early education programs must provide high-quality early education and child development services, including for children with disabilities, that promote children's cognitive, social, and emotional growth for later success in school. An early education program must embed responsive and effective teacher-child interactions. All programs must implement a research-based curriculum, and screening and assessment procedures that support individualization and growth in the areas of development described in the Alaska Early Learning Guidelines and support family engagement in children's learning and development. A program must deliver developmentally, culturally, and linguistically appropriate learning experiences inclusive of language, literacy, mathematics, social and emotional development, approaches to learning, science, physical skills, and creative arts.



Development Process

- May 2022
 - Alaska Reads Act passed
 - Requires Early Education Program standards
- August-December 2022
 - Early Education Advisory Committee (EEAC) created
 - Standards drafted and review EEAC
- February 2, 2023
 - State Board of Education released Reads Act Regulations for public comment
- March 3, 2023
 - Written Public Comment Period Ended
- April 19, 2023
 - State Board of Education Regulation Hearing 3-4pm

- Classroom set-up

- Prohibition of Expulsion
- Restriction on Suspension



Curricula Overview

- Developmentally Appropriate/Evidencebased Curricula
 - Includes Preschool Science of Reading supplemental curricula from DEED approved list
- Aligned to Alaska Early Learning Guidelines
- Support for staff
- Adaptions



Screening & Developmental Evaluation

- Time-frame
- Requirement to use statewide developmental screening tool
- Communication with family
- Referral



Assessment

- Requirement to utilize Statewide Assessment tool
 - Teaching Strategies GOLD
- Administer Fall and Spring checkpoints annually
- Regular use of data for planning



Family Engagement

- Recognize importance of families
- Responsive respectful relationships
- Integration of cultural background, traditional values, and language.
- Regular communication
- Opportunities for involvement



Dual Language Learners

- Support dual acquisition or full immersion
- Use of qualified bilingual staff, contractor, consultant, or volunteer




Coaching

- Qualified coaching staff
- Coaching supports for all teachers
- Non-punitive



Continuous Quality Improvement

- Collect and analyze program data
- Self-identify strengths and needs
- Develop and implement plans
- Annually evaluate progress



Early Education Program Standards Evidence

Example

I. Teaching and the Learning Environment

(I.a.i) developmentally appropriate schedules, lesson plans, and indoor and outdoor learning experiences that provide opportunities for choice, play, exploration, and experimentation among a variety of learning, sensory, and motor experiences



Connections to Reads Act



- Districts participating in the 3-year District-wide Early Education Program grants are working to achieving standards by end of grant
 - Districts who do not meet the standards at the end of the 3 years may apply for a remediation grant
 - If a District does not meet the standards after the remediation grant, they may apply for one additional remediation grant
- Districts who meet the Early Education Program standards can apply for approval to receive 0.5 ADM
