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

Requirements to receive 0.5 ADM



Early Education Programs: Funding of 0.5 ADM



House Bill 114

Eligibility for .5 Average Daily Membership

AS 14.17.470(d-g)

A student in a district-wide early education program provided by a school district and approved by the department under AS 14.07.020(a)(8) is counted as one-half of a full-time equivalent student.

- Four- and five-year old students
- \$3,000,000 increments by year
- Funding prioritized to the lowest-performing schools
- For programs that meet 5 days per week (Average DAILY Membership)



Eligible Recipients

Operating an early education program for 4- and 5-year-olds

Meet all Alaska Early Education Program Standards

Have consulted with high-quality early education programs within the district

Are not receiving any state or federal dollars for the program AS 14.17.470

Approval Application for 0.5 ADM

Due to DEED by May 15 of each year


Consultation Requirement (Form #05-23-050)



Determine if an insufficient number of children in the district are attending a highquality childcare program



Avoid duplicate programs and facilitate resource sharing



Consult with each local and tribal Head Start program within the district's boundaries



Qualified for ADM



After Application is Fully Approved

Before September 1 may count their 4- and 5-year-old students for 0.5 ADM that school year.

After September 1st, the district's approval for ADM for those students will take effect the following school year.

Annual ADM Report and Assurances

- Annual ADM report submitted within 2 weeks of the student count period under 4 AAC 09.015(c)
 - Certified report providing assurances that all Early Education Program Standards are and will continue to be met
 - Every three years, districts will submit an ADM Renewal Application

AS 14.07.020(a)(8)

Revocation

The department may ... revoke approval of an early education program if the program does not comply with the standards adopted by the board under AS 14.07.165(a)(5)

Revocation process starts when a complaint is received by the department stating that the program is not meeting the Early Education Program Standards
