State Plans

- State Application Template from US ED- April 21, 2021
- State Application due June 7, 2021
- State requirements
 - Gather and implement stakeholder input
 - Provide supports to Districts
 - Create a plan for State set aside- 10% of total allocation
 - Evidence-based interventions
 - Summer and after school programs
 - Addressing unfinished learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic



American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act Overview

- Enacted into law on March 11, 2021
- \$122 billion for the Elementary & Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER III) Fund
- \$2.75 billion in assistance to non-public schools
- \$3 billion for special education, and additional funding for homeless children and youth, Tribal educational agencies, Native Hawaiians, and Alaska Natives



Alaska's Funding


- \$358,707,134 is provided to Alaska for the ESSER III fund
- The Alaska Department of Education & Early Development (DEED) must reserve the following for statewide programs:
 - 5% (\$17.9 million) for activities to address learning loss
 - 1% (\$3.58 million) for summer enrichment activities
 - 1% (\$3.58 million) for comprehensive afterschool programs



District Funds

- \$322,836,421 must be provided to school districts for their use
- Districts will:
 - Create a written mitigation plan and post it on their website
 - Seek public comment from stakeholder groups on the planning and use of ARP funds
 - Reserve at least 20% of their funds to address learning loss and respond to students' social, emotional, and academic needs
 - Take into consideration and address the needs of underserved student subgroups





DEED

- DEED subgrants 90% of funds to districts based on Title I, Part A
- DEED reserve funds
 - 5% for Academic Impact of Lost Instructional Time (\$17.9 million)
 - 1% for Summer Learning and Enrichment Programs (\$3.58 million)
 - 1% for Comprehensive After School Programs (\$3.58 million)

- District Grants
 - 20% of the funds must address learning loss

DISTRICTS



Purpose of Funds

- Provide safe in-person learning opportunities for students
- Support students' social, emotional, and academic needs
- Address educational inequities that were made worse by the pandemic
- Engage stakeholders and communities in the process of identifying needs and creating goals
- Promote accountability, transparency, and effectiveness in use of funds



Allowable Uses of Funds

- 16 broad categories :
- Health and safety planning and supplies
- Providing summer school and after school programs
- Making facility repairs and air quality improvements
- Addressing learning loss by increasing existing programs
- Providing new services to students to accelerate learning



Focus on Underserved Students

- Students from low-income families
- Students from each racial or ethnic group
- Gender
- Students who are English learners
- Children with disabilities
- Students experiencing homelessness
- Children and youth in foster care
- Migratory students
- Other groups disproportionately impacted by the pandemic



District Requirements



Milestones





Phase 1- 30 days from receiving allocation amounts

By June 23, 2021

- Post mitigation policies on the district webpage
 - Aligned to the most current national CDC requirements
 - Updated Smart Start Guidance will be available soon
 - Include the web link in the Program Details in GMS
 - Section A: District Plan for Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services
- Upload the signed Assurances to the Assurance Related Document page in the COVID Relief Application in GMS
 - Include: DUNS Number, SAM Expiration Date, Suspension and Debarment Question



Phase 2-90 days from receiving allocation amounts

By August 23, 2021

- Complete the ARP Act: ESSER III Program Details of the COVID Relief application in GMS
 - Evidence-Based Interventions
 - Stakeholder Engagement



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
