

Review of TSI Designation



Initial AK ESSA State Plan (written in 2015, implemented in 2017):

"Have one or more subgroups whose accountability index value is less than or equal to the Lowest Performance Threshold of Title I schools identified as the lowest performing 5% in each year." This definition of TSI identifies all TSI schools for TSI and ATSI. TSI designation federally required to be determined annually.



Proposal: TSI as its own Designation

Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI)

- Student group for any school, Title I and non-Title I, meets or falls below the TSI Threshold (lowest 10% of all schools) for two consecutive years (starting with data from 2023/2024 school year)
- First designation will happen Fall of 2025 using data from 23/24 and 24/25
- Designation determined annually



Proposal: TSI as its own Designation

Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI)

- Schools develop and implement a school improvement plan in partnership with stakeholders and informed by all indicators - <u>managed by LEA</u>
 - ie not turned in through GMS or reviewed by the SEA
 - Needs assessment is encouraged but not required
- No funding support is provided with this tier of designation
- Exit Criteria student group no longer falls in the lowest 10%



Pros and Cons



Cons:


- Additional category may cause confusion
- No funding for TSI category
 TSI category is primarily local control

Pros:

- TSI can be considered a "yellow light" for student groups who need a bit extra support before becoming ATSI
- TSI category is primarily local control
- ATSI will be able to move to every 3 year identification (to be discussed next!)





Additional Targeted Support and Improvement (ATSI)

- Designation determined every three years (next designation would be for FY29)
 - Definition remains: "Have one or more student groups whose accountability index value is less than or equal to the Lowest Performance Threshold of Title I schools identified as the lowest performing 5% in each year."



Implement	25-26	1	Yes
Implement/Data for New Cycle	26-27	2	Yes
Implement/Identify/Plan (New ATSI and CSI-TSI)	27-28	3 / Planning	Yes
(New Cycle) Implement	28-29	1	Yes



Funding Structure



- Historically ~1/3 of money provided to districts through SIG gets returned to the state
- 1003a is funded through Title 1A and can change year to year
- Keeping a static amount per site based on tier level is unsustainable
 - For three years DEED has relied on expiring money to ensure all sites are funded
 - This is risky and not in the intended purpose of the SIG
- Currently for CSI 5%, schools with 20 students receive the same funding as schools with 400 students



Proposed Funding Structure

For FY26:

- ATSI & CSI Grad receive flat funding to support SI interventions/management of plans
 - *Base Allocation of \$20,000

*Subject to change with available federal funds

- CSI 5%, CSI-TSI, and CSI MRI
 - Per Pupil funding based on Oct student count (of this year)
 - Amount to be determined annually with 1003a fund availability
 - Schools never to receive less than the Base Allocation
 - Correspondence schools receive Base Allocation
 - Schools with robust plans needing additional funding can apply for supplemental funds (including correspondence schools)



Proposed Funding Structure



Start with \$20,000 base allocation for all ATSI & CSI schools

- CSI 5%, MRI, and CSI-TSI schools per pupil K-12 rate of \$300
- If sum of \$300*PP <20,000 they receive Base Allocation
- CSI 5% and MRI schools may submit a supplemental grant application if it is determined their SIP needs additional funding
- ATSI and Grad Rate schools receive Base Allocation (\$20,000)

A school improvement plan does not need to be solely funded through the 1003(a) SI grant



Proposed Funding Structure




Considerations:

- Teacher/Student ratios
- Correspondence schools
- Funding for planning grants for the next year
 - New CSI 5%, CSI Grad Rate will be designated next year per the CSI Cycle


