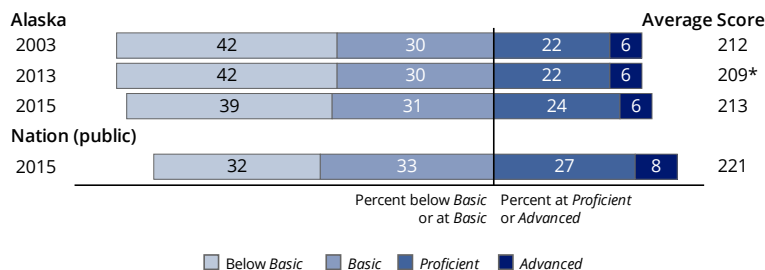


Overall Results

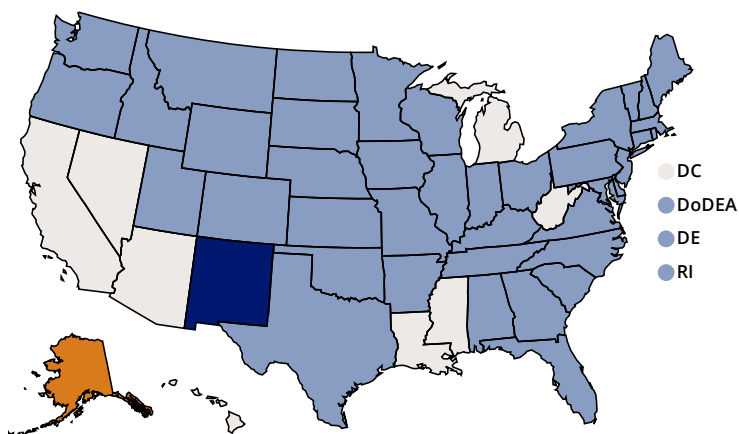
- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Alaska was 213. This was lower than the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Alaska in 2015 (213) was higher than their average score in 2013 (209) and was not significantly different from their average score in 2003 (212).
- The percentage of students in Alaska who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 30 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (27 percent) and in 2003 (28 percent).
- The percentage of students in Alaska who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 61 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (58 percent) and in 2003 (58 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions

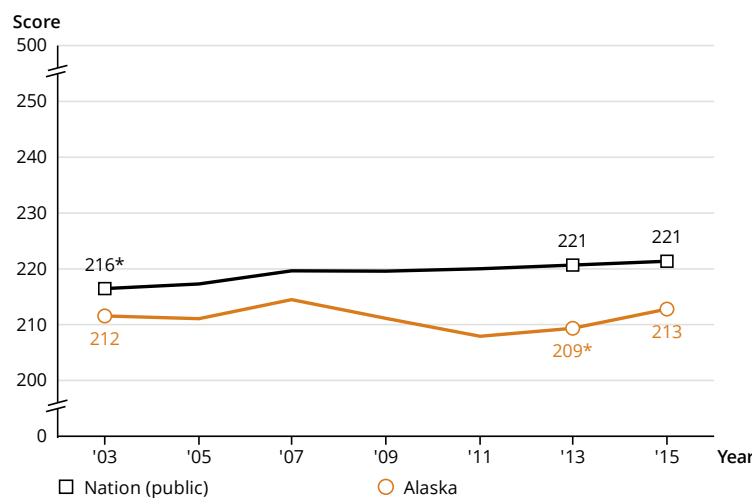


In 2015, the average score in Alaska (213) was

- lower than those in 41 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 1 state/jurisdiction
- not significantly different from those in 9 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 18 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (17 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 13 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (17 points).
- In 2015, female students in Alaska had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 6 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 32 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (32 points).
